Women's participation in the ICT sector

1. Working within the ICT industry

 Anecdotal evidence suggests that women represent around 30% of the workforce in ICT, which drops to about 9% in high management


2. Internet Governance and Policymaking

Women represent about 15% policy and decision making roles

3. Using ICT as Enabler for Progress

 Across the Arab part of the world, this has been an extreme driver as it revolutionized the way people can work and especially women, as it drop many of the obstacles. This has increased access to education and employment for women.

MENA Specific Constraints:

- Lack of awareness about women's potential as leaders
- A system that does not protect women fairly in the workforce (maternity leave, discrimination, lack of protection from sexual harassment)
- Pressure to focus on family life after marriage
- Lack of mentorship to fill new vacancies.

WAVE (the Women's Alliance for Virtual Exchange) has launched a campaign to help women break the glass ceiling in the ICT sector.







Why Women should be interested to engage in Internet Governance

41% of women have increased income and professional opportunities once they joined the world wide web



85%

of women feeling more independent because of their internet access



93%

of women feeling safer after joining the internet world



Women in rural areas and lower income groups stand to benefit the most from closing the gender gap in internet access





3. Benefits from ICTs

Despite challenges, ICTs offer a myriad of opportunities for women in the Euro-Mediterranean:

- Access to Education for Girls in parts of the region where travel outside the home is unsafe or restricted.
- Communication and Voice to Women and Girls; decreases isolationism and raises awareness on range of issues
- Tool for self-employment
