

Automatically funded:

- Member States
- Associated Countries
- Countries listed in Annex 1 of the Work Programme


South Neighbourhood

Other Partner Countries are funded when:

- Agreement exists between 2 funding bodies
- Provision made in the call text
- Commission deems participation essential







Rules of participation

Minimum Conditions:


- For standard (cooperative) research projects:
 - ➤ 3 participants from different Member States or associated countries

In addition, participants from any other country in the world can also be included

- •For actions aimed at individuals, like European Research Council or Marie Skłodowska-Curie:
 - ▶ 1 researcher
 - ▶ 1 host institution
 - ▶ 1 project




South MED in Horizon 2020 State of Play






Participations per Country

✓ Almost all calls are open to researchers, universities, research organisations, companies & non-governamental organisations from all over the world




✓ Anyone can join European consortia for collaborative research projects or apply for individual research projects

Open to the World

- ✓ Over €1 billion investment for 30 international flagship initiatives: All Atlantic Research Alliance (US Flagship); Mission Innovation Initiative energy (US Flagship); Canada-human data storage for personalised medicine; EU-Africa-food; EU-India-water; Russia-research infrastructure....
- ✓ Strong international component in the European Research Council (ERC) and Marie Skłodowska-Curie actions, e.g. ERC expected to fund 240 more non- EU/AC nationals as Principal Investigators




How to participate – Where to find help?

- a. H2020 Online Manual: step-by-step online guide through the Portal processes from proposal preparation and submission to reporting on your on-going project
- Beneficiary register: list of all beneficiaries participating in the EU R&I, education, and culture programmes (search for already registered organisations and their PICs)

- Beneficiaries need to register and receive a 9-digit Participant Identification Code (PIC)
- Quote your PIC in all correspondence with the Commission!

ou want to participate in a project proposal, your organisation needs to be registered and have a 9-digit rticipant Identification Code (PIC). Please quote your PIC in all correspondence with the Commission register contains all beneficiaries participating in the EU research and innovation or education, audiovisual cultural programmes.

Ur organisation already registered? PIC search check whether your organisation has already been registered. If so, no need to register it again.

To register, you need to login in the Portal or, if you are a new user, create your account.



National Contact Points (NCPs)






National Contact Points

- The network of National Contact Points (NCPs) is the main structure to provide guidance, practical information and assistance on all aspects of participation in Horizon 2020.
- Established also in many non-EU and non-associated countries "international partner countries".
- Personalised support on the spot and in applicants' own
 languages for all aspects regarding Horizon 2020 participation
- Organise workshops and information events
- Established, operated and financed by EU Member States, associated countries and third countries
- Nominated by national ministries to the European Commission





What is the NCP network?

NCPs are national structures established and financed by governments of the 28 EU member states and the states associated to the framework programme. NCPs give personalised support on the spot and in applicants' own languages. The NCP systems can vary from one country to another from highly centralised to decentralised networks, and a number of very different actors, from ministries to universities, research centres and special agencies to private consulting companies.


